- 1) The Words That Made Us: America's Constitutional Conversation 1760-1840 by Akhil Reed Amar (Basic Books, 2021). The story of the Constitution from 1760-1840.
- 2) American Epic: Reading the U.S. Constitution by Garrett Epps (Oxford). Epps leads a fascinating literary explanation of the 7,500 words of the document itself.
- 3) The Summer of 1787: The Men Who Invented the Constitution by David O. Stewart (Simon and Shuster). A compelling narrative of the brilliant though sometimes angry and scheming personalities who produced the first written charter for a republic.
- 4) **The Federalist Papers** by Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and John Jay (various). First published as newspaper advocacy pieces, these 85 essays on the new American government have never been surpassed.
- 5) Ratification: The People Debate the Constitution, 1787-1788 by Pauline Maier (Simon and Schuster). Once the U.S. Constitution was written, the state still had to ratify it, which proved to be a difficult, dramatic, and enlightening process.
- 6) James Madison and the Struggle for the Bill of Rights by Richard Labunski (Oxford). The framers of the U.S. Constitution forgot to include most protections for individual rights, so Madison and the First Congress undertook that essential effort in 1789.
- 7) **The Heritage Guide to the Constitution** by David F. Forte (4 Patriots). A unique line-by-line analysis explaining every clause of America's founding charter and its contemporary meaning.
- 8) Foundation for Freedom: A Study of the United States Constitution—Workbook by Lars R. Johnson (Christian Liberty Press). Explores the historical background of the Constitution, then examines it in detail and addresses its fundamental principles.
- 9) Creation of the American Republic, 1776-1787 by Gordon S. Wood (Chirp Books). Identifies, traces, and explains the changes that took place in American constitutional thinking between independence and the writing of the federal constitution.
- 10) **Plain, Honest Men: The Making of the American Constitution** by Richard Beemen (Random House). Opens in the final days of the Revolution with a bankrupt Congress, a mutinous army, and 13 quarrelsome, suspicious states.
